CREATING A GUILD

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- Start out informal Create social media outlets. Invite people to share projects and join. Meet in coffee shops, Panera, other free meeting space. Don't immediately jump in and form a charter and require dues. Go grassroots and let it organically grow.
- 2. Don't get discouraged. Lack of participation or attendance can be discouraging. If going to the quilt exhibit at the museum didn't generate attendance, try a sew day. If Saturday had low turnouts try Friday etc. If at first your don't succeed, try again. Something will stick.
- 3. Encourage don't discourage. Don't chase any traditional quilters away being the quilt police. Everyone interpretation of modern quilting is different, what I might consider modern you might not. We all have different styles, and opinions and it's important to be respectful and encourage the creativity and exploration in modern quilting.
- 4. Be welcoming. Kind of along the same lines of encouraging, is being welcoming, don't let it be girls club that's too exclusive to get to know new faces and new members.
- 5. Consistency. Something else we learned was being consistent helped people block calendars, and arrange sitters.
- 6. Logistical Stuffs. Build a board that is driven, organized, has someone who understands the finances. Divvy up roles; make sure each person knows the expectation and feels comfortable doing it.
- 7. Outreach. Determine your target audience. Build relationships with local stores or local popular quliting personalities.

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
